What is a vape?
 A vape is an electronic smoking device.

Vapes or E-cigarettes?
 Vapes and e-cigarettes are the same thing, vapes has become a normalized term to separate them from being associated to cigarettes.

What else are they called?
 They have many other names such as electronic smoking device, electronic cigarette, e-cig, vape pens, vapours, e-hookah and new names being made-up regularly.

Vapes are safe, right?
 No, they are neither safe nor harmless. Vaping products, like e-juice are *not regulated* which means there are no rules or testing done to ensure safety or accurate labelling. You can't be sure what is in them, or if the concentrations of the chemicals are toxic or not. They are not natural products and have many chemicals in them that may be approved for consumption as food, but not to be inhaled after being heated.

Vapes and youth

- ✓ Youth are being targeted to purchase these products.
- ✓ Youth are at higher risk of being negatively affected by these chemicals.
- ✓ They come in many flavours, these flavours are full of added chemicals.
- ✓ Although they say they do not contain nicotine, many do have it.
- ✓ These devices are re-normalizing smoking and people worry youth will become regular smokers.

What should I know about vapes?

- ✓ They are not approved as a smoking cessation method.
- ✓ Due to lack of regulation and rules, manufacturers are not required to disclose ingredients such as nicotine.
- ✓ The batteries are quite unstable and are the cause of fires, explosions and severe injuries.
- ✓ The stronger the battery, the higher the temperature the liquid reaches, causing an increased chemical reaction.

All you need to know about inclement weather policies in the



St. Paul Education

Extreme Cold Weather and Busing in the Afternoon

In an effort to support student learning and better accommodate families, St. Paul Education will now be running afternoon buses during extreme cold weather *under certain conditions*.

Current Practice

Busing is cancelled for the entire day if the temperature and/or wind chill in the morning is -40°C or colder.

New Practice (to begin January 27, 2020)

Busing is still cancelled if the temperature and/or wind chill in the morning is -40°C or colder.

If morning buses are cancelled, afternoon buses will now run when the www.weathernetwork.com/ca forecast predicts warming to a minimum temperature and/or wind chill of -35°C .

Communication

When families are told about the morning busing, they will also be told about the decision for afternoon busing. These decisions are usually made in the morning, but during stretches of extreme cold weather, decisions regarding busing may be made the evening before.

For example:

- 1) 6 AM morning forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -45°C and afternoon forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -40°C . Parents will be informed at that time that buses will not be running all day.
- 2) 6 AM morning forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -42°C and afternoon forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -35°C . Parents will be informed at that time that buses will not run in the morning but WILL run in the afternoon.
- 3) 7 PM the evening before, the morning forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -44°C and the afternoon forecast temperature and/or wind chill is -40°C . Parents will be informed at that time that buses will not be running all day the next school day.

Please Note:

- If afternoon buses are running and your child is at school, your child will go home on the bus as usual unless the school is notified of other arrangements.
- As the safety of our children is always a top priority, parents/guardians make the final decision on whether or not to send their child to school.
- Conditions such as fog, freezing rain, and snowstorms are unpredictable and may occur in only isolated regions of the division. This change in practice only applies to extreme cold weather. In these situations (ie: fog, freezing rain, and snowstorms) decisions will be made on a case-by-case basis.
- Decisions will be based on information gathered from www.weathernetwork.com/ca in each school attendance area. This means that afternoon busing may occur in one area and not another.
- Decisions about curricular and extracurricular activities will be made on a case by case basis.










Welcome to our **Catholic Corner!**



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Alberta Education Accountability Pillar Survey

As an annual check-up on the education system, the Accountability Pillar provides an opportunity for Alberta Education and school authorities to ensure that we are equipping students for success.

The Accountability Pillar uses a set of 16 indicators consisting of: surveys of students, parents and teachers on various aspects of quality; student outcomes such as dropout and high school completion rates; and provincial assessments of student learning.

From January to the end of February, Alberta Education will be conducting the annual Accountability Pillar Survey. In February, parents of students in grades 4, 7 and 10 will receive a survey from Alberta Education. Also, in February, students in grades 4, 7 and 10 and all teachers will be completing their surveys online at school.

All surveys are anonymous and ask questions about experiences with the school. In addition to English and French, the parent survey is available in Chinese, Punjabi, Arabic, Blackfoot, Cree, Korean, Spanish, Tagalog and Urdu.

Your participation in the survey helps provide important information on the quality of education your child is receiving, so we encourage you to return your survey promptly.

Survey results will be available to school authorities in May , and will be reported publicly as part of their 3-Year Education Plans and Annual Education Results Reports.



2020-21 Draft Calendar - The draft calendar is being circulated, awaiting feedback from administrators and school councils. The calendar will be reviewed at the February 12, 2020 board meeting.

Alberta Rural Ed Symposium - The early bird registration deadline is January 24th. Trustees will email the Chair with their intentions to attend.

2020-21 Budget Development: New funding framework is expected in March or April but preparatory steps are being taken to plan a range of scenarios. Restraint shall be shown with regards to expenses, such as filling vacancies, large capital expenditures (ie: buses), division PD and meeting costs at all levels. Consideration shall be given to school and transportation fees for the next school year. Time will be set aside at the January and February information meetings for further budget planning. Superintendent Brodziak has begun a review of all levels of SPERD.

Policy Committee Update- The committee has been updating policies to align with the new Education Act. Policies 3, 4, 6 and 22 were reviewed and approved. Changes to policies 10 and 11 were tabled to allow the Policy Committee time to review.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- An update on the Alertus app was provided. As of this week, approximately 80% of our 925 bussed families (includes Town of St. Paul and buses operated by or contracted by St. Paul Education) have signed up.
- Class V Driver Training is being offered at 5 schools. The cost is reduced from \$850 to \$350/family and a student can earn 3 credits. There are currently 60 students registered across the Division.
- The Communications Committee is celebrating staff on social media. Schools are encouraged to pass on pictures of student learning, staff success stories, events, etc...
- Inclement weather: Even if buses are cancelled, schools remain open and meaningful learning will occur. Parents make the final decision about sending their children to school. Buses do not run if the temperature and/or wind chill is -40 or colder. The infographic "Is my child's bus running?" was shared on social media.
- Trustees requested Administration to review the feasibility of running buses in the afternoon on days that buses are not running in the morning. In consultation with bus drivers and administrators, the decision to run afternoon buses will be communicated at the time of the morning busing decision. Information will be sent to families once a final draft is completed.
- Diploma exams: Superintendent Brodziak reviewed highlights from the Alberta Education Diploma Examination General Information Bulletin with Trustees. As per the Bulletin, diploma exams go on as scheduled regardless of weather conditions unless a decision to cancel diploma exams is made at the Provincial Government level. Local school authorities are not permitted to cancel these exams independently. Parents are asked to make every reasonable effort to get their child to school while balancing safety concerns. Exemptions may be applied for by the Principal and are only granted by Alberta Education in extenuating circumstances such as inclement weather, acute illness, court subpoena, surgery, etc... Deferment is another option that allows students to write the exam at a later scheduled date.
- Together We're Better is organizing the "Your Choices Matter" event which is a program for Grade 9 students in St. Paul. Students will be taught about the dangers of drinking and driving, alcohol and drug abuse and distracted driving. In Two Hills, Myrnam and Elk Point local agencies host similar events.
- A Coding Club was hosted at Glen Avon School in partnership with MCSnet. Fourteen students participated. There is division-owned equipment that can be used at other schools.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

- In December the province requested enrolment projections for the 2020/21 school year. Our early projected enrolment numbers indicate status quo at this point, but it is difficult to make budget projections without a funding model from the Province.
- Alberta School Board Insurance Exchange (ASBIE) is hosting a subscriber meeting on February 3, 2020. A major topic of discussion will be about the future of the reciprocal and sourcing adequate insurance for less cost.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

*CTEC repairs are almost complete. Prior to using the facility, final inspections will be completed.

*At Ashmont, discussions are underway to undertake some of the parking lot construction under the direction of the Division.

*Letters have been drafted to AB Infrastructure to address concerns regarding work yet to be completed at the Ashmont and THMS.

INFORMATION/CORRESPONDENCE

- School Council and Committee meetings
- ASBA Zone 2/3 Meeting Dec 6 - topics included funding model, transportation (MELT, speed restriction and cameras on buses).

AP Amendments (AP 521): Trustees reviewed the recent changes to AP 521- Advertising, Canvassing and Commercial Solicitation. It is now at the school council level to inform further and will be back on the agenda for the February Board Meeting.

CDA Shade Structure Grant: Trustees reviewed a grant opportunity from the Canadian Dermatology Association for up to \$18 000 to build a shade structure. Information will be shared with schools.

Occupational Health & Safety Committees - The Province removed the requirement for OH&S committees at individual school sites, allowing for one central committee with representation from all sites.

Protection of Students with Life-Threatening Allergies Act - This Act came into effect in Alberta on Jan 1, 2020. AP 321 has been updated to include the requirement for all school sites to have a minimum of 1 EpiPen in stock for emergency situations. All schools have purchased the EpiPens locally for their site.

ASBA Advocacy Initiatives: Executive Director Vivian Abboud has invited Boards to share 1-3 initiatives to highlight across the province. There will be a meeting for Board Chairs on January 24, 2020.



AP 521 Advertising, Canvassing and Commercial - All requests for advertising will go through the Superintendent's office for greater consistency and fewer disruptions to student learning.

Trustee Conference Schedule: Trustees discussed the feasibility of attending various PD events or conferences in this time of fiscal restraint. The number of events or requests to attend is increasing. More discussion was tabled to the January 2020 meeting.

2020-21 School Calendar: The Board of Trustees reviewed draft calendars. They will be forwarded to schools and School Councils to be reviewed and to solicit feedback. The final calendar is expected to be approved at the February Board meeting.

AERR Report & Plan: The Three Year Plan and AERR were approved.

Fall Budget Update: Secretary-Treasurer Champagne reviewed an update to the 2019-2020 budget. St. Paul Education is looking at a 1.8 million dollar deficit. As was the case for most districts SPERD was also impacted by a significant increase of \$652 000 in insurance fees. In response to the financial challenges facing boards, the province is permitting all divisions a one time opportunity to re-allocate IMR normally reserved for facility updates and upkeep. The Division has applied to reallocate a total of \$825 000 to operating which will mostly be used to offset the unexpected insurance increase. The result is that for this year, some maintenance projects will be deferred in order to protect the classroom. Even with this, St. Paul Education will be in a deficit position of \$800 000. Going forward there remain many unknowns due to changes in the funding model expected in the spring. All signs are pointing to a challenging budget next year and all areas are being reviewed including the possibility of additional fees.

ECS Registration: Schools will begin accepting registrations for Fall 2020 Kindergarten on January 6, 2020, for children who will be 5 years old by December 31, 2020.

Policy 18, 19, 20: Trustees reviewed Policy 18, 19, 20 as part of their regular review. Changes are to be referred to the Policy Committee to update these documents to reflect the Education Act.

Alberta Rural Education Symposium: Registration is open for March 1-3, 2020, however, the Board of Trustees is tabling discussion to the January 2020 Board Meeting.

French Immersion Philosophy: In light of increasing enrollment in the French Immersion program, two draft documents are being reviewed by administration and lead teams about the philosophy behind the program.

Minister's Visit: Trustee Starosielski, Trustee Anderson and Superintendent Brodziak had a meeting with the Minister of Education. It was a good news sharing session and the Board is looking forward to a visit from her in the new year.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- Busy schedules in schools with the Christmas activities. Thanks to all staff and students for their hard work in preparation for Christmas celebrations. Thank you for all the school groups that give back to our communities.
- Class 5 Driver training will be available for SPERD high school students in this 2019-20 school year. We are partnering with Saint Paul Driving school. This will include 15 hours of instruction and then requires 10 hours of driving practice on weekends and PD days. Rather than \$850, the cost to parents will only be \$350. Three high school credits are available for Class V Driver Training 35-3 Locally Developed Course and a certificate of completion.
- February 1 is the deadline for the Honoring Indigenous Spirit student awards.
- Staff celebration nomination forms have been created by the Communication Committee. The committee is looking to celebrate 3 staff members on a monthly basis from across the division for the fantastic things that go on in our schools.
- Emergency Protocol information was shared on the website and social media.
- *Don't Let This Be Your Last Choice* event has been approved for all grade 9 students in the spring of 2020
- On December 2, 2019, school administrators presented their successes and challenges and then networked with one another to make an action plan for future goals. Trustees were in attendance.

FINANCIAL UPDATE

- Secretary Treasure Champagne shared that the 2018-19 audited statements are up on the website showing a \$729 000 deficit.
- The application for the reallocation of the IMR funds has been submitted. Waiting for approval from the minister's office.

CAPITAL PROJECTS

A letter to request planning funds of \$35 000 from Alberta Infrastructure for our number one capital project of the Mallaig School. This funding request is for a geotechnical site assessment.

INFORMATION/CORRESPONDENCE

- Administrative Council Key Points
- AP Amendments included updating legal references and current terminology
- Program for International Student Assessment (PISA) - Provincial results place 15-year-old Albertans in the Top 10.

ASBA/ACSTA General Meetings: Trustees enjoyed great keynote speakers such as Patti Ann Laboucane Benson and Bob Murray. Several resolutions were passed to be developed into ASBA policy statements. Rural Caucus discussed the increases in insurance and other funding changes.

Learning Network: Trustee Young reported on the draft Curriculum Implementation Annual report that was shared at the last Board meeting. The final version of the report with audited financial statements will be on the Learning Networks website soon. The priority areas identified by AB ED for this year are limited to two areas: LearnAlberta.ca and French language.
